This Summary Note (the “**Summary Note**”) has been prepared in connection with the issue by ING Bank N.V. (the “**Issuer**”) of a minimum of SEK 50,000,000 5 Year Fund Linked Participation Notes due July 2016 (the “**Notes**”) under its €50,000,000,000 Global Issuance Programme (the “**Programme**”).

This Summary Note constitutes a summary note and, together with the Registration Document and the Securities Note (each as defined below), a prospectus (the “**Prospectus**”) for the purposes of Article 5 of Directive 2003/71/EC (the “**Prospectus Directive**”) for the purpose of giving information with regard to the Issuer and the Notes which, according to the particular nature of the Issuer and the Notes, is necessary to enable investors to make an informed assessment of the assets and liabilities, financial position, profit and losses and prospects of the Issuer and of the rights attached to the Notes.

The Issuer accepts responsibility for the information contained in this Summary Note. To the best of the knowledge of the Issuer (which has taken all reasonable care to ensure that such is the case), the information contained in this Summary Note, when read together with the Registration Document and the Securities Note, is in accordance with the facts and does not omit anything likely to affect such information.

On 31 March 2011, the Issuer published a Base Prospectus (the “**Original Base Prospectus**”) in respect of the Programme. On 11 May 2011 the Issuer published a supplement to the Original Base Prospectus (the “**BP Supplement**”) and together with the Original Base Prospectus, the “**Base Prospectus**”). On 11 May 2011 the Issuer published a Registration Document (the “**Registration Document**”). On the date hereof, the Issuer published a Securities Note in respect of the issue of the Notes (the “**Securities Note**”). This Summary Note should be read and construed in conjunction with the Securities Note (which incorporates by reference certain sections of Chapter 1 of the Base Prospectus and the details of relevant parties to the Programme on the last five pages of the Base Prospectus (the “**List of Parties**”)) and the Registration Document. The Registration Document was filed with the AFM and approved by it on 11 May 2011. DESCRIPTION OF THE ISSUER

The Issuer is a subsidiary company of ING Groep N.V., also called ING Group. ING Group is the holding company of a broad spectrum of companies (together called “ING”), offering banking, investments, life insurance and retirement services to about 85 million private, corporate and institutional clients in Europe, the United States, Canada, Latin America, Asia and Australia. Originating from The Netherlands, ING has a workforce of about 107,000 people worldwide. ING Group holds all shares of ING Bank N.V., which is a non-listed 100% subsidiary of ING Group. On 26 October 2009, ING announced a new strategic direction. It will separate its banking and insurance operations and develop towards a mid-sized international Bank, anchored in the Netherlands and Belgium, and predominantly focused on the European retail market with selected growth options elsewhere. On the same date, ING announced that all Insurance operations (including Investment Management) would be divested over the following four years.

In 2010, ING Bank introduced a new reporting structure reflecting two main business lines: Retail Banking and Commercial Banking. Under this structure, ING Direct has been included within Retail Banking. This reporting structure has been applied in respect of the Issuer’s annual report for the year ended 31 December 2010 and the banking business disclosure included in the ING Group quarterly reports as from the first quarter of 2010.

The Issuer is a large international player with an extensive global network in over 40 countries. It has strong established positions in The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg and key positions in Poland, Romania and Turkey, the largest Central and Eastern Europe markets. ING Bank holds strong positions in Germany, France, Italy, Spain, the United Kingdom and the United States. ING Bank also has profitable businesses in Canada and Asia/Pacific. It has an extensive international network to service and support its corporate clients. From 1 January 2011, ING Bank began operating as a stand-alone company.. With more than 72,000 employees, the Issuer is active through the following Business Lines: Retail Banking, including ING Direct and Commercial Banking.

Retail Banking provides retail and private banking services to individuals and small and medium-sized enterprises in The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, Poland, Romania, Turkey, India, Thailand and China (through a stake in Bank of Beijing) with a multiproduct, multi-channel distribution approach. In mature markets, Retail Banking focuses on wealth accumulation, savings and mortgages, with an emphasis on operational excellence, cost leadership and customer satisfaction. In developing markets, Retail Banking aims to become a prominent local player by offering simple but high quality products.. ING Direct offers direct banking services in Canada, Spain, Australia, France, the US, Italy, Germany, the United Kingdom and Austria. ING Direct’s focus is on offering five simple and transparent retail banking products at very low cost: savings, mortgages, payment accounts, investment products and consumer lending.

Commercial Banking offers core banking services such as lending, payments and cash management in more than 40 countries. It provides clients with tailored solutions in areas including corporate finance, structured finance, commercial finance, equity markets, financial markets and leasing. Clients are corporations – ranging from medium-sized and large companies to major multinationals – as well as governments and financial institutions.

The Issuer was incorporated under Dutch law in The Netherlands on 12 November 1927 for an indefinite duration in the form of a public limited company. The Issuer is registered at the Chamber of Commerce of Amsterdam under no. 33031431 and its corporate seat is in Amsterdam, The Netherlands. The articles of association were last amended by notarial deed executed on 30 December 2009.

The Issuer and its consolidated subsidiaries are involved in litigation and arbitration proceedings in The Netherlands and in a number of foreign jurisdictions, including the United States, involving claims by and against them which arise in the ordinary course of their businesses, including in connection with their activities as insurers, lenders, employers, investors and taxpayers, certain examples of which are described immediately below. In certain of such proceedings, very large or indeterminate amounts are sought, including punitive and other damages. While it is not feasible to predict or to determine the outcome of all pending or threatened legal and regulatory proceedings, the Issuer is of the opinion that neither it nor any of its consolidated subsidiaries is aware of any governmental, legal or arbitration proceedings (including any such proceedings which are pending or threatened of which the Issuer is aware) in the 12 months period preceding the date on which the Prospectus was filed with the AFM and approved by it, which may have, or have in such period had a significant effect on the financial position or profitability of the Issuer and/or its consolidated subsidiaries.

Because of the geographic spread of its business, ING Bank may be subject to tax audits in numerous jurisdictions at any point in time. Although ING Bank believes that it has adequately provided for all its tax positions, the ultimate resolution of these audits may result in liabilities which are different from the amounts recognised.

Purported class litigation has been filed in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York alleging violations of the federal securities laws with respect to disclosures made in connection with the 2007 and 2008 offerings of ING's Perpetual Hybrid Capital Securities. The Court has determined that the claims relating to the 2007 offerings were without merit and has dismissed them. The challenged disclosures that survived the Court's ruling relate solely to the June 2008 offering, and primarily to ING Group's investments in certain residential mortgage-backed securities.

In January 2010 ING lodged an appeal with the General Court of the European Union against specific elements of the European Commission's decision regarding ING's restructuring plan. In its appeal, ING contests the way the European Commission has calculated the amount of state aid ING received and the disproportionality of the price leadership restrictions specifically and the disproportionality of restructuring requirements in general.

In January 2011 the Association of Stockholders (Vereniging van Effectenbezitters, "VEB") issued a writ alleging that investors were misled by the prospectus that was issued with respect to the September 2007 rights issue of Fortis N.V. (now: Ageas N.V.) against Ageas N.V., the underwriters of such rights issue, including the Issuer, and former directors of Fortis N.V. According to the VEB the prospectus shows substantive incorrect and misleading information. The VEB states that the impact and the risks of the subprime crisis for Fortis and Fortis' liquidity position have been reflected incorrectly in the prospectus. The VEB requests a declaratory decision stating that the summoned parties have acted wrongfully and are therefore responsible for the damages suffered by the investors in Fortis. The amount of damages of EUR 18 billion, has not been substantiated yet. ING will defend itself against this claim; at this time ING is not able to assess the future outcome.

In March 2011, ING Groep N.V. was informed of the decision of the board of Stichting Pensioenfonds ING (the Dutch ING Pension Fund) to institute arbitration against ING's decision not to provide funding for indexing pensions. While it is not feasible to predict the ultimate outcome of these arbitration proceedings, ING Groep N.V. is of the opinion that these will not have a significant effect on the financial position or profitability of ING Groep N.V.

DESCRIPTION OF THE NOTES

Capitalised terms used in this section but not defined shall be deemed to be defined as such for the purposes of the Conditions set forth in the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note.

GENERAL

The Notes are denominated in SEK and are expected to be issued by the Issuer on 11 July 2011 (the “**Issue Date**”). Unless redeemed early, the Notes are due to mature on 11 July 2016 (the “**Maturity Date**”). The total amount of the series will be a minimum of SEK 50,000,000 and each Note has a nominal amount of SEK 10,000 per Note (the “**Specified Denomination**”). The issue price of the Notes is 110 per cent. (indicative). The Notes are senior notes in uncertificated and dematerialised book-entry form. Application will be made for the Notes to be admitted to trading on the Luxembourg Stock Exchange with effect from the Issue Date or as soon as possible thereafter. The Notes will be cleared through Euroclear Sweden AB.

The Final Redemption Amount of this Note consists of the combination of (i) the Bond Component and (ii) the Option Component.

Save for the occurrence of an Early Redemption Event, the Bond Component of the Note will be redeemed at 100% of the Specified Denomination per Note on the Maturity Date, being the partial principal protection at maturity.

The Option Component of the Note reflects the possible upside exposure in the Master Portfolio. The value of the Option Component is determined on the basis of the average value of the Master Portfolio over the last 13 months of the tenor of the Notes, for a total of 13 observations compared to the value of the Master Portfolio on the Strike Date. If the average value of the Master Portfolio across all Averaging Dates is lower than or equal to the value of the Master Portfolio on the Strike Date, the value of the Option Component equals zero. The value of the Option Component is exposed to the development of the EUR/SEK exchange rate. The value of the Option Component shall never be lower than zero. The Final Redemption Amount of the Note equals the value of the Bond Component plus the value of the Option Component.

The Master Portfolio is composed of a Reference Portfolio, a Deposit Portfolio and a Leverage Portfolio. Within the Master Portfolio, notional investments may be allocated to the Reference Portfolio and/or the Deposit Portfolio and a Leverage Notional Amount may be established which shall be applied towards the notional subscription of additional Reference Portfolio Interests. The Master Portfolio may be rebalanced on a daily basis between the Reference Portfolio, the Deposit Portfolio and the Leverage Portfolio. Application of allocation adjustments within the Master Portfolio commences on the Strike Date. No interest will accrue on any amounts allocated to the Deposit Portfolio and no interest is paid by the Master Portfolio on the Leverage Notional Amount (if any). Allocation to the Reference Portfolio in the Master Portfolio is dependent on the historical realized volatility of the Fund Interest Price, which is measured as the weighted standard deviation of the Fund Interest Price over the past 40 Fund Business Days.

If the historic realized volatility increases, allocations within the Master Portfolio to the Reference Portfolio may be reduced, and subsequently the Leverage Notional Amount may be repaid in full or in part and the assets allocated (if any) to the Deposit Portfolio may be increased with any remains after any notional repayment of the Leverage Notional Amount. Allocations within the Master Portfolio to the Deposit Portfolio will not be higher than 100% of the Master Portfolio Value.

If the historic realized volatility decreases, allocations within the Master Portfolio to the Reference Portfolio may be increased, and subsequently the Leverage Notional Amount may be increased or established (as the case may be) and the assets (if any) allocated to the Deposit Portfolio may be decreased. Allocations within the Master Portfolio to the Reference Portfolio will not be higher than 130% (indicative) of the Master Portfolio Value.

The Leverage Notional Amount may only be increased in case no assets are allocated to the Deposit Portfolio. The Deposit Portfolio may only be increased in case the Leverage Notional Amount is reduced to zero.

Reallocations within the Master Portfolio only will occur if the Scaled Realized Volatility of the Master Portfolio is lower than 23% (indicative) or higher than 27% (indicative). In that case the allocation to the Reference Portfolio shall be equal to the ratio of (a) 25% (indicative) and (b) the Realized Volatility of the Fund Interest Price.

EXAMPLE 1:

If the allocation within the Master Portfolio to the Reference Portfolio is 100% (and thus the allocation to the Deposit Portfolio is 0%) at a certain Fund Business Day and the Realized Volatility is 35%, as a result the allocation to the Reference Portfolio becomes $25\% / 35\% = 71.43\%$. In that case the remaining 28.57% of the Master Portfolio will be allocated to the Deposit Portfolio.

EXAMPLE 2:

In case the Realized Volatility on a certain Fund Business Day is 21%, the allocation to the Reference Portfolio will be equal to $25\% / 21\% = 119.05\%$. Allocation to the Deposit Portfolio will be -19.05%.

EXAMPLE 3:

In case the Realized Volatility on a certain Fund Business Day is 18%, the allocation to the Reference Portfolio will be equal to $25\% / 18\% = 138.89\%$. However, allocations within the Master Portfolio can never be higher than 130% (indicative), the allocation to the Reference Portfolio will be 130%. Allocation to the Deposit Portfolio will be -30.00%.

The examples set out above are no indication, prediction or guarantee of future performance of the Notes, the Fund or the Managed Portfolio. No rights may be derived from these examples.

All above mentioned indicative values will be fixed by the Issuer on or about 22 June 2011 and shall be announced on www.ingstructuredproducts.com in accordance with the Terms and Conditions of the Notes section of the Securities Note.

An investment in the Notes is a notional investment in the Master Portfolio and is not a direct investment in the Fund. Due to the reallocation mechanism, based on observations of the volatility of the Fund Interest Price, an investment in the Notes (and subsequently, a notional investment in the Master Portfolio) may generate different returns compared to a direct investment in the Fund.

INTEREST

The Notes do not bear interest.

RETURN AT MATURITY

Subject to Condition 19(b) of the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note and unless previously redeemed or purchased and cancelled as specified below, each Note will be redeemed on the Maturity Date by the Issuer at the Final Redemption Amount. The Final Redemption Amount shall be calculated in accordance with the following formula:

$$\text{Bond Component} + \text{Option Component}$$

Where:

“**Bond Component**” means the outcome of the following formula:

Specified Denomination x Minimum Redemption

“**Option Component**” means the outcome of the following formula:

Specified Denomination x Participation x $\text{MAX}\left[0; \frac{\text{MPV(End)}}{\text{MPV(Start)}} - 1\right] \times \left[\frac{\text{FX(end)}}{\text{FX(start)}}\right]$

Where:

“**Averaging Date**” means the 22th calendar day of each month in the period from and including 22 June 2015 to and including the Expiration Date, in each case subject to adjustment in accordance with the Fund Business Day Convention and Condition 19(b) of the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note. There are 13 Averaging Dates.

“**EURSEK**” means the published foreign exchange rate on the Relevant Date expressed as the amount of SEK per one EUR as displayed on Reuters page “ECB37”, or on such other information service, as determined by the Calculation Agent in its sole and absolute discretion. If EURSEK however does not appear on Reuters page “ECB37” (or on any other information service as determined by the Calculation Agent) on the Relevant Date, EURSEK shall be determined by the Calculation Agent in its sole and absolute discretion in good faith and in a commercially reasonable manner, having regard to any relevant market practice.

“**Expiration Date**” means 22 June 2016, in each case subject to adjustment in accordance with the Fund Business Day Convention and Condition 19(b) of the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note.

“**Final Date**” means the first Business Day immediately following the Expiration Date.

“**FX(end)**” means the EURSEK on the Final Date.

“**FX(start)**” means the EURSEK on the Strike Date.

“**Fund**” means AGI China East Asia Fund.

“**Fund Interest**” means a unit, share, partnership interest, or other similar direct interest in the Fund that entitles the holder of such interest to a share in the net assets of that Fund (ISIN LU0212839673, Bloomberg code: AGEAGRF LX <EQUITY>), or such relevant interests in any Replacement Fund as determined by the Calculation Agent in accordance with Condition 19(c) of the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note.

“**Minimum Redemption**” means 100%.

“**MPV(End)**” means the arithmetic mean of the Master Portfolio Value across all Averaging Dates.

“**MPV(Start)**” means the Master Portfolio Value on Strike Date.

“**Participation**” means 100% (indicative, the final Participation shall be determined by the Issuer on or about 22 June 2011 and shall be announced on www.ingstructuredproducts.com. The final Participation shall not be less than 80%).

“**Relevant Date**” means (i) in respect of FX(end), the Final Date and (ii) in respect of FX(start), the Strike Date.

“Strike Date” means 22 June 2011, in each case subject to adjustment in accordance with the Fund Business Day Convention and Condition 19(b) of the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note.

“Master Portfolio Value” means on the Strike Date, the Aggregate Nominal Amount of the Notes, and subsequently shall be equal to the sum of the value of the Reference Portfolio, the Deposit Portfolio and the Leverage Portfolio.

REDEMPTION BEFORE THE MATURITY DATE

The Notes may be redeemed before the Maturity Date in the following circumstances:

- (i) an event of default by the Issuer;
- (ii) if 90 per cent. or more in nominal amount of the Notes issued have already been redeemed (at the discretion of the Issuer); and
- (iii) If the Calculation Agent determines that that an Early Redemption Event, as specified in Condition 5(c) of the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note, has occurred.

If the Notes are to be redeemed in the circumstances described in (i), (ii) or (iii) above, the Issuer shall redeem each Note at an amount (in SEK) equal to the fair market value of a Note determined by the Calculation Agent in its sole and absolute discretion.

OTHER TERMS

The Notes include other terms relevant to investors, including the following:

- certain dates for payment of principal on the Notes and determination of the Fund Interest Price and the Master Portfolio Value to which payments on the Notes are linked may be delayed if, among other things a Disrupted Day (as defined in the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note) occurs.
- the Issuer may amend the terms of the Notes (including amounts payable under them) if an Substitution Event (as defined in the “Terms and Conditions of the Notes” section of the Securities Note) or any other event or events occur which the Calculation Agent determines necessitate(s) an adjustment or adjustments to the Final Redemption Amount, the Early Redemption Amount and/or any other relevant Term of the Notes.

COSTS

The costs associated with the issue of the Notes (for marketing, legal work, administration, and distribution of the Notes) are reflected in the pricing of the Notes and will not be separately charged to investors.

RISK FACTORS

Investing in the Notes involves risks. The Notes are partially principal protected at maturity, however the market value of the Notes may fluctuate during their term and hence, if sold in the secondary market or redeemed prior to maturity, prospective investors risk losing their entire investment as a result of an Event of Default or part of it otherwise. See Parts 1 and 2 of the “Risk factors” section of Chapter 1 of the Base Prospectus, and the risk factors below for information on the risk factors to be taken into account when considering an investment in the Notes. If in doubt, potential investors are strongly recommended to consult with their financial advisers before making any investment decision.

The Notes may not be a suitable investment for all investors

A prospective investor should conduct its own thorough analysis (including its own accounting, legal and tax analysis) prior to deciding whether to invest in the Notes. Any evaluation of the suitability for an investor of an investment in the Notes depends upon a prospective investor’s particular financial and other circumstances, as well as on the specific terms of the Notes. If a prospective investor does not have experience in financial, business and investment matters sufficient to permit it to make such a determination, the investor should consult with its financial adviser prior to deciding to make an investment as to the suitability of the Notes.

The Notes are complex financial instruments. A potential investor should not invest in the Notes unless it has the expertise (either alone or with a financial adviser) to evaluate how the Notes will perform under changing conditions, the resulting effects on the value of the Notes and the impact this investment will have on the potential investor’s overall investment portfolio. Prospective investors risk losing their entire investment as a result of an Event of Default or part of it otherwise.

The return on the Notes is linked to the performance and volatility of the underlying Fund

The return on the Notes is linked to the performance and the volatility of the underlying Fund. The levels of the Fund Interest Price may go down as well as up throughout the life of the Notes. Fluctuations in the levels of the Fund Interest Prices will affect the value of the Notes. An increase or a decrease of the volatility of the Fund Interest Price will affect the value of the Notes.

Accordingly, before investing in the Notes, prospective investors should carefully consider the performance and volatility of the Fund. Results of Fund achieved in the past are no guarantee of future performances and volatility. Prospective investors risk losing their entire investment as a result of an Event of Default or part of it otherwise.

No gross-up

All payments made by the Issuer in respect of the Notes shall be made subject to any tax, duty, withholding or other payment which may be required to be made, paid, withheld or deducted. Noteholders will not be entitled to receive grossed-up amounts to compensate for any such tax, duty, withholding or other payment.

Redemption amounts consist of a Bond Component and an Option Component.

Redemption payments can be divided in (i) a Bond Component and (ii) an Option Component. The value of the Bond Component will accrue to 100 per cent. of the Specified Denomination on the Maturity Date. The Bond Component constitutes the partially principal protected nature of the Note on the Maturity Date. If the Notes are redeemed prior to the Maturity Date, the value of the Bond Component will be less than 100% of the Specified Denomination. Redemption of the Option Component is subject to postponement provisions. The value of the Option Component or the value of the Bond Component will never be less than zero.

Foreign exchange rate risk in relation to Option Component

The value of the Option Component is exposed to the development of the EUR/SEK foreign exchange rate. The EUR/SEK exchange rate may go down as well as up throughout the life of the Notes. Fluctuations in the EUR/SEK exchange rate will affect the value of the Notes. A negative development of the EUR/SEK foreign exchange rate will have a negative impact on the value of the Option Component.

Postponement of redemption

Redemption payment of the Option Component of the Notes on the Maturity Date or the Early Redemption Date (as applicable) is subject to a holder of Fund Interests receiving the proceeds of redemption of such Fund Interests deemed to have submitted for redemption to the Fund. Should such redemption of Fund Interests and/or the receipt of proceeds of redemption of Fund Interests be postponed, redemption payment of the Option Component of the Notes will be postponed accordingly. In case such redemption of Fund Interests or the receipt of the proceeds of redemption of such Fund Interests be postponed for a period of 2 years or more following the Maturity Date or the Early Redemption Date (as applicable), the value of the Option Component of the Notes shall be zero or such other amount as the Issuer determines in its sole and absolute discretion.
